Paralympics

So the 2016 Rio Paralympics have concluded. While I myself was unable to watch every second of every event nearly as closely as I wished to, I have still done my best to keep up with the happenings. This year's Paralympics were AMAZING; there were so many great moments and achievements made by so many amazing people! Like Ibrahim Hamato, the Egyptian man who held his own against the world's greatest table tennis players and made it to the preliminary rounds of the Paralympics with no arms! I'm being serious just look him up on YouTube it's just so amazing and inspiring to watch.

Or Matt Stuzman, the 33 year old Kansas resident who holds the world record for farthest accurate archery shot, despite having no arms. Stuzman managed to hit the target with no more than his feet and shoulders

from 283.47m away, taking the record previously held by an able-bodied competitor. Stuzman also won a silver medal in the London Paralympics 4 years ago.

Even my homeland Nigeria was represented strongly at the games, specifically in the weight lifting category. Roland Ezuruike lifted four times his body weight in the men's -54 kg final.

Lucy Ejike shattered all world records three times in a row by managing to lift 136 kg, 138 kg and eventually 142 kg to win the women's -61 kg division.

At the end of it all Nigeria won six golds, two silvers and a bronze just in weightlifting and won two other golds in other events. Leading to an unprecedented and incredible haul of 8 gold medals! And that makes me so proud. I hope that one day I can come close to achieving as much as any of the Paralympians who inspired me so much this year.

Ceasefire in Syria - How Long Will it Last?

A ceasefire between the United States of America, the Russian Federation, Syrian President Bashar al-Assad and other rebel groups, began on Monday 12th September and was set to end at 4pm on the 19th. The ceasefire applied to many different groups including over 100 groups of rebel fighters, who all respected the week long cease fire.

This truce did not apply to ISIS or Jabhat Fateh Al-Sham, another prominent terrorist group in Syria. However there were problems. Humanitarian aid sent to Syria was delayed and this delay was blamed on politics. It was hoped joint military operations would

take place, however humanitarian aid deliveries have been targeted resulting in casualties.

The ceasefire is still holding but relations are incredibly fragile. Both America and Russia have been accused of breaking the ceasefire. The ceasefire may not be renewed by the Americans if the Russians are found to be responsible for the bombings of aid trucks on Tuesday. Russia is firmly denying these allegations and are also accusing America of intentionally killing Syrian soldiers but whatever hopes there were for US-Russian cooperation, they are now slowly diminishing.


Junior School Adopting a Nest Box!

... 1943, British submarines attempted to sink the German battleship Tirpitz as it sat in Norwegian waters. The Tirpitz was the second largest battleship in the German fleet. Attacks had already been made by the RAF but failed to hit in 1942. Attacks continued to be made against the German battleship, including an attempt to drive a two-man craft up to the ship and plant explosives in the hull. In September, six midget British subs set out to take the Tirpitz down for good; only three of the six made it to their target. This time, they were successful in attaching explosives and did enough damage to put it out of action for six months.
